# Reflection



In this Year of Mercy we have been reflecting on the categories of acts of mercy in Jesus' Parable of the Sheep and the Goats, found in Matthew 25. The separation of the good and the bad is really rather dramatic - imagine the hook of the shepherd's crook at full force - but it has served us at school as a reminder of the radical need our world has to be put right... by us! That was the message of Laudato Si' and that is the context of the Year of Mercy.

But mercy to others goes hand in hand with mercy to ourselves. We beat ourselves up too much as


our lives zigzag in different directions. But that is what Lent is for - reimagining ourselves, redirecting ourselves, reloving ourselves. We can go for big, dramatic actions if we want, but, just like in the Sheep and the Goats where it is the simple act of recognising Jesus in the stranger that counts, so too in our lives can simple actions be just as powerful as giving lots of things up for Lent. One challenge I've set the school is to say a quick prayer every time they pass our Lent cross in the vestibule - and it can be a prayer with words or just the recognition of God's presence.

Our Lent cross has been made from our Christmas tree - a visible sign of the link between Christmas and Easter and a reminder that our salvation came not just from the big gesture of Jesus' sacrifice, but also from the simplicity of Jesus' birth in the stable. Mercy is not a word that should inspire grand gestures, but simplicity, for small, simple, permanent changes can and will change the world.



# Year 10 and 11 Astronomy students are 'enlightened' about the Aurorae Borealis and will journey through our solar system at Winchester Science Centre


Lucky students who are taking Astronomy as one of their GCSE options have had two exciting enrichment activities to attend recently! Thanks to the Southampton schools OGDEN partnership, which St Anne's has been part of for three years, the girls were able to attend an inspiring lec-

ture, on Wednesday 24<sup>th</sup> February, by Dr Melanie Windridge, plasma physicist, former researcher

at Culham centre for fusion energy and schools lecturer for the IOP), The talk was entitled 'Seeing the light' and explained the physics behind the natural phenomenon that is the aurorae borealis. They even had the chance to hear more about Melanie's route in to science as a career and to ask her questions on the aurorae and being a physicist! Thank you to Mr Oxford for supervising them on this trip.

On Friday 11<sup>th</sup> March, as part of our National Science and Engineering week celebrations, the Year 10 and 11 astronomy classes attended a bespoke planetarium show by Winchester Science Centre's own Astrophysicist covering the key elements of our Planetary systems module – an amazing experience and excellent way to revise key aspects of their GCSE specification.

# Year 8 get a 'Health MOT' with the Medical Mavericks!

Monday 7<sup>th</sup> March saw Year 8 participate in an action packed, hands on day with special guests the Medical Mavericks, who bring the science of medicine and sport alive in the classroom. Pupils were lucky enough to take part in 5 workshops throughout the day where pupils learnt about the science behind a range of health and medical monitoring and diagnosis.

They tested their own fitness in a high-tech sports science lab, met STAN the life-size patient simulator and even had a go at administering their own ultrasounds and ECG's, intubating 'Ed the head', used a syringe to take blood from a special arm and much more!

Along with these interactive workshops pupils also explored the issue of drugs in sport and evaluated the effects of caffeine on their reaction times and concentration, as well as their general health.

The girls had an amazing day with the Medical Mavericks and were exceptionally well-behaved and engaged with all of the activities. Our visitors were very impressed and are looking forward to meeting more of our pupils next year!









### Eureka Club News

This term the science club have been investigating the marvels of nature with three unique projects. We started the term making dyes from different natural sources including onion, pomegranate and red cabbage. Surprisingly onion proved to be the best colour especially when mixed with Alum! It was really interesting to see how different fabric took up the colour and what they looked like down the microscope.

Inspired by the rather chilly weather, our next project was investigating how penguins keep warm in the huddle. This was really fun as we all got to "dress up" our penguin cans to see if clothes made a difference to how quickly they cooled.

We finished the term with a special visit from a one of the Student ambassadors from the University of Southampton Marine Biology course. Miss Hooper brought



in a sample of Solent mud which had been collects on the Universities research boat Calista. We then sifted through the mud to find out what was living in it! It was very messy but amazing to see the variety of shells and even some live worms.





Every year, St Anne's World Book Day gets bigger and better. This year we had over 40 members of staff in amazingly elaborate fancy dress, with favourites including Ms King's Captain Hook [Peter Pan], Mr Waterfield's Hagrid [Harry Potter] and Mr Oxford's Seneca Crane [Hunger Games]. During the day, hundreds of students were on a race to win our annual Character Hunt Quiz, as they tried to find which teacher was playing each character. Our winner, for both the quiz and for the Best Dressed Teacher award, will be announced soon.

As well as our Character Hunt, this year we also ran a large two-week competition which challenged our students to complete as many of 20 book-related activities as they possibly could. Activities varied from the silly to the creative to the philosophical. It has been a tremendous success with many hilarious and inventive entries. Here are some examples of the most popular challenges our students have undertaken:

- Write an alternate version of the song *Do You Want to Build a Snowman* for a book you love.
- Come to the Library and take our *Harry Potter Sorting Hat Quiz* to find which Hogwarts House you belong in.
- Swap favourite books with a friend who has *very* different taste from you. Who did you swap with? What books did you swap and why?
- Write an alternate or missing scene from a book you love in roughly 500 words.
- Hollywood has given you permission to make a film adaptation of any book you like. Which book would you turn into a film and who would you cast as the main characters?
- 'All great literature is one of two stories: a man goes on a journey or a stranger comes to town.' (Leo Tolstoy, author of *War and Peace*) Do you agree with this statement?
- Act out an important scene from one of these books: The Lord of the Rings, Harry Potter, To Kill a Mockingbird, Divergent, Pride and Prejudice or The Diary of a Wimpy Kid.

# Geography

Another great term for Geography. Students have worked hard and have produced some amazing pieces of work over the past few weeks.

Year 7 have been studying settlement sites and shopping patterns. On a damp week in March students all braved the elements for their first taste of geography fieldwork with a trip to Bedford Place. Despite the weather students were able to collect some useful data and have spent the past couple of weeks analysing their results to gain an understanding of how the area around our school is used.

Year 8 started this term by looking at sport, studying the location of stadiums and how far trade can make a difference to the people who produce spots goods. They are now exploring the diverse country of 'India'. Year 9 have been enthralled by the 'Fantastic Places' they have discovering in class trying to solve the problem of rolling rocks in deserts and why a doomsday seed vault would be created and placed in Svalbard (near the Arctic Circle!). The last part of the topic involved deciding which places would make their classes' top "7 wonders of the world". Students produced some fabulous speeches and posters to persuade the rest of their class to agree with them.

At KS4, Year 10 spent the first half of this term studying their GCSE unit on Tectonics which they have thoroughly enjoyed as it covers volcanoes, earthquakes and tsunamis. They worked hard towards their recent exams and many students gained some excellent results. The year group are presently engaged in their new unit of study, tourism.

Year 11 were totally engrossed in 'The Restless Earth' last half term and have now reached the final stages of the GCSE course. One lesson a fortnight is given to revision and students have been given opportunities to try out a variety of revision techniques such as modelling, there have been some very imaginative interpretations of some of the case studies we have covered! Revision classes are underway Thursdays after school. Pupils are encouraged to attend, as a variety of topics and techniques will be covered. Smaller revision sessions are also being provided to help and support a select group of student to reach their potential in the subject.

There has been a positive response to the purchase of Revision guides in the department and this will continue.

The Sixth Form have had a very busy term, starting with their Pre Public Exams in January. The Upper Sixth have continued with their studies of 'Ecosystems', 'Tectonic Hazards' and 'Urbanisation' and are being given plenty of revision and exam practice in class and for homework. The Lower Sixth are presently studying their optional units on 'Coasts' and 'Health' and are busy practising 'Geographical Skills'.

Urban Fieldwork will take place in lesson time after Easter. Students will be walking through a few areas of Southampton in order to study and compare the characteristics of contrasting urban environments. This will be valuable revision for their units on 'Population' and 'Skills'.

Next term is all set to be a busy one with fieldwork opportunities for many students. We are in the final stages of planning for the Year 9 residential trip to Eden, Cornwall as well as day trips for Year 10 to complete fieldwork needed for their exams.

# Careers

# Work Experience in Year 10





In Year 10 all students will be taking part in work experience from:

# 7th to 18th November 2016

- Work experience planning starts in Year 9
- A business partner that St Anne's works with is EBP South. They carry out all the necessary health and safety checks to enable students to undertake work experience safely
- The work experience website is http://ebpsouth.work-experience.co.uk
- Students can use the EBP website to source placements if they want to. User names and passwords were allocated on the Enrichment Day March 7th
- Once work experience is chosen from the website, the application will be processed and monitored but students also need to log on regularly to check updates
- A placement however, can be secured without using the website and this can be done by approaching an employer directly to source an off-line placement.

Advice: sourcing a placement directly can be a much quicker process than using the web-site to find a placement.

- If a student decides to find a placement themselves that is fine, as this usually results in them securing a placement immediately
- It is a good idea to think about work experience as soon as possible; what would be interesting, how easy it is to get to an employer and whether the employer can provide 2 weeks work experience
- It also often helps to talk to friends, family and any contacts that may be able to offer work experience
- If a placement has already been secured or there are already some possibilities, that is ideal. It is never too early to enquire about work experience
- If a placement is sourced 'Off-Line', then an off-line form must be completed and given to Sharron Ward as soon as possible (forms available from Student Support, Reception and Key Stage 3)
- Consent forms *must* be completed for all placements. This is to enable us to carry out health and safety checks and to make sure the employer choice is right for the student. No student can undertake work experience without the right checks in place

# When deciding on a placement it is important to think about interests, career aspirations and an employer that would be good to work for.

### Important things to remember regarding work experience:

- Think about and start applying for work experience right away it is a long process.
- Don't worry if there are no ideas regarding a future career. It is important to choose something that would be interesting and would be a valuable experience.
- Make sure the placement is easy to get to.
- Discuss work experience with as many people as possible for ideas and inspiration
- Choose wisely, it may be difficult to change.
- When a placement is *cancelled by a student* after an application has been processed, the school is invoiced £35 admin charges. <u>This charge is passed to the relevant student for payment.</u>

Work experience is an enjoyable and rewarding experience and there are lots of people in school to help. In particular I work in school on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday however there are also tutors, teachers and the Head of Year to help with questions and concerns.

# eBooks in School

Students are now able to borrow eBooks from our exciting new eBook library! eBooks can be read on most tablets, smartphones, laptops and desktops.

### Reading through your web browser

To access the eBook library students simply needs to:

- visit southamptonsls.wheelers.co (there's no need to put www. at the start or .uk at the end)
- your username/password can be collected from the School Library
- click on Get Started to browse and borrow eBooks

Once borrowed, use the Read Now button to start reading the eBook

# Reading through the ePlatform app

If you're using an apple, android or windows tablet (or an apple or android smartphone) you can also access the eBook library via the ePlatform App.

The advantage of using the App is it automatically saves your eBook within the App, making it easy to retrieve and read your eBook offline.

- In your App store, simply search for 'ePlatform by Wheelers' to find the App
- Once downloaded, search for 'Southampton' within the 'Find Your Library' link
- Select 'Southampton School Library Service' when it comes up

This takes you to the eLibrary where you can then sign in, browse and borrow eBooks as above

Students can borrow 3 eBooks at a time, which will expire automatically from their device after two weeks.

If you have finished with an eBook before the loan has expired, you can return it early. To do this, just click on the title within 'My Shelf' and click 'Return this title'.




